Background of Proverbs

• Titled in the Hebrew, sepher mish'le'i, the meaning is literally book of proverbs.

 Several of the authors are named within the book: Solomon, Hezekiah's men, Agur, and King Lemuel.

 The book was probably compiled either by Hezekiah's men around 700 BC, or by a later redactor such as Ezra or the like.

A Collection of Wisdom

- Proverbs is a collection of inspired, wise sayings
- Note the authority cited by 4 NT writers (who accounted for at least 16 of the 27 NT books)
 - Proverbs 3:11 in Hebrews 12:5-6
 - Proverbs 3:34 in James 4:6, 1 Peter 5:5
 - Proverbs 10:12 in James 5:20, 1 Peter 4:8
 - Proverbs 11:31 in 1 Peter 4:18
 - Proverbs 22:8 in 2 Corinthians 9:7
 - Provers 25:21 in Romans 12:20
- Because it is a collection, we will handle it here exegetically and topically (verse by verse in topical context).

Purpose Statement for Proverbs

To know wisdom and instruction, to discern the sayings of understanding, to receive instruction in wise behavior, righteousness, justice, and equity; to give prudence to the naïve, to the youth knowledge and discretion, a wise man will hear and increase in learning, and a man of understanding will acquire wise counsel, to understand a proverb and a figure, the words of the wise and their riddles (1:2-6)

Theme of Proverbs

"the fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction" (1:7)...For the Lord gives wisdom; from His mouth comes wisdom and understanding" (2:6).

Methodology of this Study

Step 1 – As Proverbs provides wisdom, instruction, sayings of understanding, and instruction in wise behavior (1:1-3a), we will **exegete each individual proverb** in its own context.

Step 2 – We will identify each individual proverb's thematic emphasis as counsel.
Step 3 – We will categorize each proverb into an area of counseling to develop an approach for practically applying the Proverbs

Step 4 – We will seek to be wise people who listen to counsel, as in Proverbs 12:15

Foundational Principle: Meaning ≠ Significance

Step 1 – Observe Step 2 – Interpret Step 3 – Correlate/Confirm

Step 4 – Apply

Primary Application – how the original audience applied the content, one application (if in the text), and often is part of the meaning of the passage Secondary Application – how we apply the content, there can be many applications. this is *significance*. Secondary application is not part of the passage's *meaning*.

One Way to Apply Proverbs

"The way of a fool is right in his own eyes, But a wise man is he who listens to counsel." – Proverbs 12:15
